

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
OFFICER OPPORTUNITIES IN AMERICA'S NAVY RESERVE

As a college-educated professional in one of the specialty areas sought by the Navy Reserve, you may receive an appointment as a Direct Commission Officer. Direct Commission Officers use their knowledge and experience to ensure the safety and security of our country. You will also assume responsibility for the well-being and performance of the men and women who serve under you.

Direct commissions are available to U.S. citizens with professional skills in the following fields:

- Civil Engineering
- Dental
- Engineering
- Human Resources
- Information Professional
- Information Warfare
- Intelligence
- Medical
- Nursing
- Oceanography
- Public Affairs
- Seal
- Strategic Sealift
- Supply

If you currently hold a commission in the Inactive Ready Reserve (IRR), you may affiliate with America's Navy Reserve through the NAVET program. Veteran Officers who hold a commission from other branches of the military may apply for a Navy Reserve direct commission through the Interservice Transfer Program. In most instances, you will be able to retain your previous rank. Talk to your Navy Reserve Officer recruiter for details on how these programs may apply to you.

Your first assignment as a newly commissioned Navy Officer, will be attending Officer Development School (ODS) in Newport, RI. Here you will learn about the history, traditions and structure of the Navy and Navy Reserve.

After successful completion of ODS, in most cases, you will report to the Navy or Navy Reserve facility closest to your home. Normally, you will train at the local facility on your scheduled weekends. The result is that you won't miss important events in your life – or your civilian career. You'll be able to experience the closeness of family while also working to keep America safe.

You'll have opportunities to travel during your two weeks of Annual Training. Go virtually anywhere in the world, from regional bases and air stations to Navy vessels located thousands of miles away. As a Direct Commission Officer in the Navy Reserve, you can see the world... without leaving your life behind.



THE NAVY RESERVE OFFICER CAREERS



Aerospace Engineering Duty Officer (AEDO)

AEDO's provide professional management and technical direction in the entire air weapon system acquisition process from design to production and product improvements of Naval aircraft, spacecraft, and weapons. Over one-third of AEDO billets are flying billets. AEDO's test and evaluate new aircraft, weapons, support activities, headquarters, research, development, test and evaluation, manufacturing and production.

All newly commissioned officers will attend the five week Officer Development School (ODS) in Newport, RI. At a minimum, a Bachelor of Science degree from an accredited university in Physical Science or engineering is required, and a Master's degree in the same concentration is highly desired.



Aerospace Engineering Duty Officer (Aerospace Maintenance) (AMDO)

AMDO's provide full time direction in development, establishment, and implementation of maintenance and material management policies and procedures for the support of naval aircraft, airborne weapons, attendant systems and related support equipment. In addition to working in fleet maintenance organizations throughout the fleet, AMDO's are involved in all aspects of material acquisition and support as top-level Program Managers in NAVAIR and as Commanding Officers of the Naval Aviation Depots.

A minimum of a Baccalaureate degree with a concentration in Engineering, The Physical Sciences, Business Administration, or Management is required, and a Master's degree in the same concentrations is highly preferred.

Selectees must attend/complete the five-week Officer Development School (ODS) (within the first year), Aviation Maintenance Officer (AMO) School, and Joint Aviation Supply and Maintenance Material Management (JASMMM) course (within first two years).



Chaplain Corps

In the Chaplain Corps, ministers, priests and rabbis offer pastoral counseling, teach religious education and conduct religious services for military personnel and their families.

Navy Reserve Chaplains without prior military experience must complete a seven-week course at Navy Chaplains School in Newport, RI. This course may be divided into two parts and completed over two years. All candidates must have a Master of Divinity or equivalent degree, as well as endorsement by an ecclesiastical agency recognized by the Armed Forces Chaplain's Board.



Civil Engineer Corps

Civil Engineer Corps (CEC) Officers are responsible for managing the construction and maintenance of Navy and Marine Corps shore facilities. CEC Officers may manage the construction and maintenance of a wide variety of facilities, including schools, streets, parks, hospitals, factories, research centers, utility systems, harbors and airports worldwide – as well as timberland and oil and mineral deposits that are managed by the Navy.

Additionally, CEC Officers are responsible for leading the Seabees – the Navy and Marine Corps military construction force.

A Bachelor of Science in Engineering – preferably civil, mechanical, electrical, construction, industrial, ocean, environmental or architecture – from an ABET or NAAB-accredited college is required.

All newly commissioned officers will attend the five-week Officer Development School (ODS) in Newport, RI within one year of commissioning.

Cryptologic Warfare Officers



Cryptologic Warfare Officers – specializing in the creation of deciphering or coded communications – are trained by the Navy Reserve Security Group to operate and maintain a wide array of specialized electronic equipment. All candidates must complete a Tier 5 (T5) investigation and possess a Bachelor's degree; preferred majors include physics, math, political science, foreign language, economics, geography, or history.



Engineering Duty Officers

Engineering in the Navy Reserve focuses on three primary areas: research and development; fleet maintenance support; and the design and acquisition of new ships, submarines and their propulsion systems.

Newly commissioned Officers attend the Direct Commission Officer Indoctrination Course in Newport, RI. Subsequent Annual Training sessions will be performed at Navy shipyards, sea tours, and mobilization sites, as well as other designator-specific training courses at various locations.

Candidates must possess a calculus-based Bachelor's Degree in engineering, physics, computer science, metallurgy, chemistry or navy architecture. A Master's Degree in engineering, registration as a professional engineer, or current participation in an engineering master's degree program is also required.



Information Professional Officers



Information Professional Officers are the Navy's Cyberspace Defensive Operations and Communications Officers with subject matter expertise in networks, computer systems, satellite communications, cyber defense, information & knowledge management, and Command and Control. This community is responsible for the maintenance, operation, and development of cutting-edge cyberspace systems, as well as global telecommunications and space systems that have been designed to operate under the most adverse conditions - from the deep ocean environment to outer space.

Degrees directly related to information systems, cyber security, electrical, computer, or systems engineering, or other STEM/technical fields, are strongly preferred, but not required. Candidates may be expected to hold some IP certifications, including but not limited to CISSP, Network+, Security+, and CCNA.



Intelligence Officers

Intelligence Officers are experts in the collection, analysis and dissemination of information that supports the needs of operational warfare commanders. Imagine using tactical and space-based imagery, computers, radar, acoustic sensors and electronic signals surveillance to analyze intelligence data in support of Counter Terrorism, Homeland Defense and various military operations around the globe.

Intelligence Officers are selected from a diverse range of backgrounds. Degrees in math, chemistry, physics, engineering, computer science, business management, political science, foreign area studies, international relations, Navy/military history or foreign languages are preferred but not required; candidates will be evaluated on a "whole person" concept. Candidates with advanced degrees and/or experience in these fields are highly desirable.

All newly commissioned officers will attend the five-week Officer Development School (ODS) in Newport, RI within one year of commissioning.



NAVY RESERVE OFFICER CAREERS (CONTINUED)



Judge Advocate General (JAG)



JAG's are Navy lawyers. The Judge Advocate General's (JAG) Corps Direct Appointment Program (DA) permits attorneys to be appointed directly into the Navy Judge Advocate General's Corps as lieutenants (junior grade) in the U.S. Naval Reserve for eight years, with at least one year active in any Navy rate. The one-year cumulative active duty requirement may include any combination of active duty from either active duty or as a Reserve member such as Active Duty for Special Work (ADSW)/Active Duty for Training (ADT)/Annual Training (AT)/or active duty under Reserve Mobilization orders. Must be currently practicing before federal/state court, and must already have a Bar license.



Oceanography Officers



Oceanography Officers keep the Navy's fleet and shore establishments safe and ready. They use the physical sciences – oceanography, meteorology and geospatial information and services – to support Navy strategy and tactics. They also assess and predict environmental impacts on Navy platforms, weapons systems, and sensors from design through development, test and evaluation and operational implementation. Candidates should have a Bachelor's Degree in meteorology, oceanography, geodesy, astronomy, mathematics, physics, geophysics or engineering.



Public Affairs Officers

Serving as the eyes and ears of the Navy and Navy Reserve, the Public Affairs team is responsible for the delivery of visual, audio and written information to internal and public audiences. A Bachelor's Degree in mass communications, journalism, advertising, marketing, radio/TV, photojournalism, public relations, motion picture production or a related field is required.



Supply Corps Officers

As the Navy's business managers, Supply Corps Officers are responsible for purchasing, inventory control, storage, financial management, auditing, merchandising, transportation, computer systems, contracting and other related areas. All candidates must attend two consecutive periods of Supply Corps Officers School in Newport, RI, followed by 15 months of extensive correspondence course work.



Surface Warfare Officers



Surface Warfare is the cornerstone upon which maritime dominance is built. Surface Warfare deals with the entire range of Navy missions. Anti-Submarine Warfare (ASW), Anti-Air Warfare (AAW), Anti-Surface Warfare (ASUW), Land Attack, Theatre Air Missile Defense (TAMD), and support for Marine Corps missions are all within Surface Warfare expertise and responsibility.

All newly commissioned officers will attend the five-week Officer Development School (ODS) in Newport, RI within one year of commissioning.

Education, medical training, experience and current Navy policies determine an Officer's rank upon commissioning. Financial incentives may also be available for physicians in critical specialties. For details, ask your Navy Reserve Officer recruiter.

Medical Service Corps

The Navy Reserve offers Allied Health Professionals the opportunity to become Commissioned Officers in the Medical Service Corps – an opportunity that will enable you to gain a depth and breadth of experience unrivaled in the civilian sector, even as you serve your country in a true leadership position.

The Medical Service Corps includes clinical, scientific and administrative specialists in a host of healthcare fields, and focuses primarily on research, management, direct patient care, environmental support services, nutrition and administration.

Dental Corps

The Navy Reserve offers dentists unique training opportunities, professional challenges and responsibilities that extend well beyond the scope of civilian dental practice. The Dental Corps Officers provide quality care to Navy and Marine Corps personnel, and augments the Medical Corps in times of national emergency to provide mass casualty and trauma care.

Reserve Dental Officers typically drill at local Navy facilities, dental facilities, and occasionally aboard ships or in Fleet Hospitals. Annual training sites vary from the most modern and well-equipped facilities to adverse environmental field conditions.

Nurse Corps

In the Navy Reserve Nurse Corps, you'll be a key member of a prestigious team of healthcare professionals – and an Officer. Our nurses enjoy assignments that span the complete range of the nursing practice, from medical and surgical to critical care, perioperative, anesthesia, and administration. You may be afforded opportunities for advanced nursing education.

The Navy Reserve has exceptional opportunities for professional development in new and exciting environments, plus the pride of playing an important role in serving your country. To qualify, you must have a valid nursing license and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Financial incentive programs may be available for qualified Nurse Corps Officers in critical specialties.

Commitment

America's Navy Reserve Officers enjoy the pride, camaraderie and sense of accomplishment that only come with serving their country. A commitment of just one weekend a month and two weeks of Annual Training per year earns you full membership.

To ensure that your service never means sacrificing connections to your family, community and civilian career, weekend drilling typically occurs at a Navy facility located closest to your home. Annual Training, on the other hand, can take you virtually anywhere on the globe. For two weeks each year, your service as an Officer can lead you to the far corners of the world, exposing you to opportunities and experiences unlike any other.

Most Officers fulfill their commitment on "traditional" drill weekends. Others may serve on weekdays if their civilian careers make weekend service difficult. Talk to your Navy Reserve Officer recruiter for details on flexible drilling options and how they may apply to you.

For Direct Commission Officers, the initial commitment is eight years. During this time, you will earn points toward your retirement and enjoy many opportunities for promotion – even as you develop the confidence, leadership and expertise to take your civilian career to new heights.

Promotions

As a Navy Reserve Officer, you'll have ample opportunities for promotion. Promotions for Navy Reserve Officers follow the same guidelines as those of active duty Navy Officers.
